


- The Councils response to the City Vision 2050 for Edinburgh to be FAIR, THRIVING, PIONEERING and WELCOMING.
- Creates a "golden thread" which knits together and communicates how all the work of the organisation is driving towards 3 key priorities; poverty, sustainability and wellbeing.
- Responding to and taking lessons from COVID-19
- Prioritises and supports role of communities and community organisations
- Communicates a clear Council strategy for a **fair and green recovery**
- The plan acts as a guide for the next three years to focus on the priorities and deliver real improvements for everyone who lives here.



- Inequalities of impact
- Impact on retail/hospitality/tourism...
- Impact on the city centre
- Acceleration of long term transitions to a new economy
- ...plus Brexit...



A Net Zero Climate Ready City by 2030

- To be net zero by 2030 the city needs to
 - Decarbonise transport 12x faster
 - Decarbonise buildings 2x faster
 - Decarbonise homes 50x faster
 - Create more renewable energy and heat networks
 - Build to new standards with sustainable materials
 - Create new green skilled jobs
 - Strengthen the supply chain
- Infrastructure implications; planning implications; capital investment and procurement implications

- To be a net zero Council we must
 - Retrofit over 400 public buildings
 - Ensure all public buildings (including schools) are built to passive house standard and remove use of boilers before legislation changes
 - Transition all fleet (cars and vans to EV with infrastructure)
 - Change our services and supply chains to limit miles travelled and emissions generated.

Equality and Wellbeing: Healthy, Inclusive, Local Places

"Edinburgh will be a sustainable resilient city containing strong cohesive communities.

This will be supported a series of connected 20-minute neighbourhoods where the every-day needs of citizens can be provided locally." An improved approach to service delivery with a core focus on the prevention of poverty and improving health and wellbeing;

- **Co-location** of quality services from across the public sector delivered within each neighbourhood,
- Support for local economies and businesses and creation of local employment opportunities;
- Better management and use of **land and buildings** across the city
- Enhanced voluntary sector facilities, services and networks,
- High quality **placemaking** in our town and local centres,
- New ways to work, which could include 'near me' offices and more local working;
- Sustainable local active travel and onward travel
- Delivery of our **Digital and Smart** City strategy to provide everyone with access to services online or a '5-second neighbourhood'.
